A Friend's House opened in 1998 to address the community's concerns for abused, neglected and abandoned children. A Friend's House operates an emergency placement facility for children in the custody of DFCS and at the request of the Juvenile Court System.

In 2005 the opened a 14,000 SF expansion and can now serve 24 children. To date they have served 1840 children.

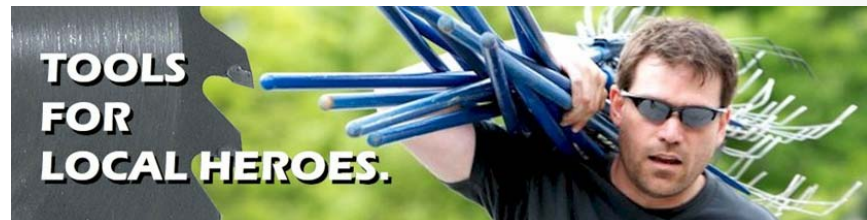


Atlanta Community Toolbank

Mission Statement

“The Atlanta Community ToolBank stewards an inventory of tools for lending to charitable organizations to increase the impact of their mission-related efforts in the community.”

The Atlanta Community ToolBank stewards an inventory of tools for lending to charitable organizations to increase the impact of their mission related efforts. During 2013, the ToolBank equipped over 54,000 volunteer with \$1.3 M worth of tools to complete 2,514 projects. The majority of tools used during projects for Hands on Atlanta are from the ToolBank. They recently purchased a 27,000 SF warehouse that houses over 25,000 pieces of tool inventory.



Child Development Association

The Child Development Association (CDA) provides affordable early learning programs and childcare for preschool children of low-income families in the metro Atlanta area. The CDA prepares economically disadvantaged children for success in education and life. And, our childcare services enable hardworking parents to maintain full-time employment to support their families.



Clarkston Community Center



The Clarkston Community Center formed in 1994 to provide art, education, recreation and community building to one of Atlanta's most diverse communities – both long-time Americans and newly arriving refugees.

CCC programs are about improving the quality of life of those they service from youth to senior.

Programs include a food pantry and coop, after-school programs, craft fairs and recreation programs – all opportunities to learn, gain skills and evolve as supportive community members.

Covenant House Georgia

In 2000, Covenant House Georgia opened its doors to provide shelter and services to Atlanta's homeless and runaway youth. More than 15,000 youth have received support from CHGA since 2000. Currently, more than 1,300 homeless and at-risk youth are served every year. The waiting list, at times, is dishearteningly long. In addition to housing their facilities include classrooms, a computer lab, a library, 2 clinic rooms and a gymnasium.

Decatur Cooperative Ministry

DCM mission is to help families facing homelessness by intervening in the immediate crisis, route family members to appropriate services, prevent or lessen their duration of homelessness, provide tangible resources and emotional support in addition to offering interim housing and emergency shelter. They have eight aging structures which require constant maintenance and renovations made all the more obvious by heavy traffic.



The Elaine Clark Center

For more than four decades The Elaine Clark Center has been supporting children with special needs from ages 6 weeks to 22 years old by providing an innovative model of education and therapeutic play. Their operation in a 13,000 SF converted warehouse has exceeded their expectations and they are scheduled to begin a 13,000 SF building expansion this summer followed by a renovation of their current building and playground.



Project Community Connections



Project Community Connections, Inc. (PCCI) specializes in connecting our consumers with a place to call home. PCCI assists individuals and families experiencing homelessness with permanent housing placements and connections to mainstream resources.

Their 7,000 SF facility also houses a commercial kitchen that provides jobs and training for individuals interested in the food service field.
